DIRECTOR'S NOTES

It's summer, and another school year is done. It's hard to believe how fast it has gone.

I am so excited that we get to share this newsletter with you. It has been an amazing year of ministry, and I hope that is reflected in the pages you read. This season has been the highlight of my fifteen years of ministry at YFC. I am so excited!

Yesterday we met with the principal and one of the vice principals at Liberty Middle School. We reflected on the year and looked ahead to the fall. They were so happy with what we did there this past year and have opened the door even wider to us in the fall. It was amazing that we were given the last period of the day, 5 days a week this past year. This fall, we can be there almost any time during the day and week we want to, to work with kids. Wow!

Another new opening has been with Moorhead Alternative Learning Center. This summer, they invited us to be a part of their summer school. We have committed to helping them with two different sessions at least once per week.

Watching God open doors and see Him use us has been so much fun. Project Serve, our ministry to encourage teachers and staff, went so well as

the school year ended, and they were so appreciative of being recognized. More kids want to continue their relationship with us over the summer than ever before. Ministry at the detention center is full steam ahead in every pod 5-6 days a week.

Thank you for praying for us, and thank you for your generosity. Your partnership is what God uses to keep this ministry moving forward. It is making a difference, and God is using you in this ministry. As this fiscal year ends, please pray for us, and if you can, consider giving to YFC. Giving has been down about \$20,000 this year. We have had money in savings to cover this, but it is tight. Normally we have peaches in June and July, but the way crops are ripening, it looks like it will be August before they arrive. This is God's ministry, and we are trusting Him for this, but as partners in ministry, it is important we make you aware.

Something I am very excited about for September is that we will be hosting a night for the community in partnership with Bethel Church and Life 97. On September 25th, we are bringing in Dr. Kevin Lehman. The topic will be Understanding, Loving, and Leading the Next Generation. It will be a night for anyone who


works with or loves kids. The dream is that teachers, youth workers, parents, grandparents...anyone...could walk away from the night knowing how to better understand, love, and lead the students in their lives. 
The Story of Joseph

Deb and I went in for Bible study with the kids in the Non-Secure pods one Friday. While there, we covered the topic of perseverance. We used part of Joseph's story, how he was sold into slavery by his brothers, as well as when Potiphar's wife tried to lure Joseph. After finishing up what we had planned, we asked the girls if they knew Joseph's story before he got sold into slavery and after the incident with Potiphar's wife. Deb and I were both taken back after hearing these three girls filling in the story of Joseph. They knew it so well that they were explaining what the dreams meant in detail, and how Joseph was forgotten in jail for years before he was released. It was so amazing to see these girls quote Scripture, it was also a learning moment for me not to put judgment on how much these kids can know. I think at times I can put limitations on the kids with how much they know due to their situations. But I've come to realize it's not the kid I'm limiting, it's God. Time and time again they exceed my limitations, and I am so grateful for God humbling me in these situations, it's such a blessing! ~William Lawyer









Car Ride Conversations

I had the opportunity to take 2 senior girls that I've been building a relationship with on a hike a couple weeks ago. During the car ride, the topics of security and identity came up. I asked the girls if they believed having a relationship with God helps with insecurities. While processing through the question, one of the girls started sharing about what God means to her. Her mom died when she was 12 years old of pneumonia and she has struggled with God ever since. She shared that even though she doesn't understand why God allowed her mom to die, she still loves Him. She mentioned that God and one other person was all she needed to get through life. I was so encouraged as I hiked with these two girls and listened to them share about how they want to learn more about God. I'm beyond excited to begin doing a bible study with them this fall and to come alongside them as they grow into young women. ~Deb Napton

During dinner, none of the girls were on their phones, but all engaged in conversation. It was so fun to have a family meal and celebrate these girls.

Aren't We Going to Pray?

Sue and I visited the secure girls pod at the juvenile center on Saturday. This is a two-hour period where we just visit with the girls, do crafts, or play games. There is no bible study topic and no prayer request time, just a visit to get to know the girls and let them talk about whatever is on their mind. One of the girls who was visiting with us that day had just recently entered the juvenile center and had attended our bible study the previous day. As we were packing up our supplies to leave, she looked startled and asked, "Wait! Aren't we going to pray before you leave?" Another girl popped up out of her seat and offered to lead everyone in The Lord's Prayer. She had a bookmark with the prayer on it and had taped it to the door to her room. The girls all joined in to pray along and gushed their thanks to us for our visit. -Kim Danielson

- O **Whip:** Typically, referring to their car or ride sometimes followed by a driving hand gesture.
- O **Parentification:** Being forced into a parental role as an adolescent or "too young." Having to care for younger siblings.
- O No Cap: No lie or for real.
- O Rizz: Charisma, someone's ability to flirt, charming.
- O **Slay:** Succeed, killed it, or something amazing.

With that in mind, we have decided to launch something we are calling, "Project Serve." It will be a ministry to our teachers and administration as a way to say, "What you are doing is important, and we are so thankful for you!"

All Rise Workshop

Deb, Sue, and I had the opportunity to attend the All Rise Community Workshop held locally in April. Many local organizations that are active with justice-involved women in the community were in attendance. It was a wonderful opportunity to connect and hear about what the biggest roadblocks are for women returning to the community after incarceration. In many cases, the teens we work with face some of these same problems with finding housing, finding a job, and completing their education. There are many reasons that drive people to committing a crime and sometimes it is desperation, which doesn't go away after they are released. Please keep these women and young people in your

From Challenge To Scripture Memorization

I had three girls in Non-Secure who did really well with memorization. I challenged them to memorize the books of the Bible for a snack of their choice (Funyuns, Taki's, or popcorn are their three faves and the options they could choose from). I had them say the books to me on two separate occasions to really test if they knew them. After that, they liked the challenge and asked what was next. The first thing that popped into my head was Psalm 23. By the next week they had that memorized! I gave them another chunk from Psalms, and they memorized that. After that I began challenging them to pick out their own verses and memorize them. They do really well with the weekly memory verse, so I challenged them to memorize 5-6+ verse chunks of scripture. One week one of the girls was struggling to memorize the passage she chose, so I helped her make actions to help her remember. This continued week after week. Recently one of the girls left, but the other two still show up with their Scripture memorized. Last week I got a little teary eyed as the two kids helped each other with gestures and encouraged each other as they recited the passage. They had it down word for word and I was so proud and encouraged by them. It warms my heart to see them be so supportive and dig into Scripture. ~Danielle Beyer



The Story Behind the White Shoes

We took students from Moorhead in our release program to a park for their last day of school. We all had a blast playing games and enjoying the sunshine. During one of the games, one of the students got her new, white tennis shoes dirty which caused her to have a melt down and walk away from the group. Her boyfriend helped her clean off her shoes and she rejoined the game. A few days later I was in a meeting with Amy, the homeless advocate at Moorhead and learned more about this girl's story. She has been displaced since she was 12 years old and is now 18 years old waiting for housing. As I thought about the incident with her shoes, it hit me that a new pair of shoes to her probably means the world for someone who has very little.

This girl has attended our program throughout the whole year, but has talked very little. I didn't know she was without a home entirely. Amy shared with me that a lot of youth who are displaced are difficult to identify because they won't outright share about their situations. I learned that our program means a great deal to this girl and how she was so afraid she would miss going to the park with us because of needing to get an Uber for transportation.

Though it is heartbreaking when we find out the stories of these students, I'm encouraged that God has placed us in their lives, even if for a short time, to be an expression of His love. We may not be able to fix their situations, but we can give them the love of Jesus. ~Deb Napton



"C" is a 14 year old girl who I had the privilege of leading to Jesus in one of the visitor rooms shortly after the first time I met her during a Bible study in the center. The day before she was released, we were hanging out in a visitor's room and I asked her if she had any prayer requests. Several weeks prior, "C" had asked if I could teach her about prayer. We had been praying together ever since and I would always ask her what she specifically

wanted to pray about. On this particular day she had replied that she had nothing to pray about because everything was going well. She knew she was leaving to live with a foster family that truly cared about her. I took the opportunity to encourage her to use the time to say a prayer of thanks to God... the kind of prayer I had yet to hear her pray. She then proceeded to pray the most beautiful prayer thanking God for showing her that there were people who loved her because she had begun to believe there wasn't anyone. Her words were sincere and from the heart and I was so blessed to witness how her prayer life has deepened.

I was able to be at the detention center to say goodbye the morning she was released and hope to hear from her soon and visit with her. I saw God work in her heart and reveal Himself to her and I know He will finish the work He has begun in her! ~Deb Napton
