


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DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Trust is the foundation of any strong relationship, especially with teenagers. It helps them feel safe, valued, and understood. When trust exists, they are more likely to share their thoughts, feelings, and challenges openly. Trust also builds respect and helps avoid misunderstandings. It shows teens that they can rely on you and that their opinions matter. Earning trust means keeping promises, being honest, and listening without judgment. Breaking trust can harm the relationship, so it's essential to work hard to maintain it. A trusting relationship helps teenagers grow confident, responsible, and ready to face life's challenges.

I am continually amazed by the level of trust we're building with students and the engagement in our conversations about Jesus. I think about our Thursday morning program with the kids from Moorhead ALC. I know many of their stories and struggles, and they keep coming back. Kids with every reason not to walk through the door of a church or hang out with a bunch of Christian adults, and yet every week, they return. Why? Because, as many

have told us, we are safe, real, and trustworthy, and I thank God all the time for that.

Every young person has a story. Some stories are joyful, filled with laughter and security, while others are a bit darker, filled with pain and uncertainty. Regardless, it's their story, and it matters. You have a story, and yours matters too. We believe all stories are meant to be stories of redemption. Why? Because we are all created in God's image, and He came to redeem us. These stories...their stories, our stories, and God's story are meant to converge. This happens in the context of relationships. At Youth for Christ, we equip leaders to engage 11 to 19-year-olds in authentic, Christ-sharing relationships. Young people can only experience true life when they are engaged in the lifelong journey of following Jesus. Jesus met people in the context of their stories. He shared life and loved others with unprecedented authenticity. We strive to do the same. We meet young people where they are, whether that's on a middle school campus, at a juvenile detention center, in a coffee shop, helping a kid

in crisis, or at a Thursday morning club. We model Jesus' relentless and patient love for young people. We don't pretend to have all the answers and can't fix every problem. But our leaders walk alongside young people through pain and heartache, as well as triumph and celebration, so they can experience true life. This is what we do. Will you join us?

It's a single day, 24 hours, during which you can join us in making an eternal difference in the lives of teens through your generosity. Friends of YFC will match a portion of giving that day. We have a God-sized goal of \$70,000 and realize it can only happen with your help. Reaching that goal will allow us to bring on a new staff member or two to help us in this mission to bring hope to these amazing kids. Will you join us?

Repeated Incarceration

I was leading a bible study on worry and anxiety with the girls at the detention center. *Tanya* was in attendance and is a girl who has been in and out of the detention center at least 5 times. The first time I met her, she seemed guiet and timid. She attended our Bible studies but didn't say much. The next few times she was at the center, she seemed more defiant and got up and declined to join us for bible studies. During Tanya's current incarceration, she has been more open, attends most Bible studies, and responds to questions. She has stated she wants to stop the cycle and move forward with her life. On this particular day, there were three interruptions in quick succession. Normally, the girls will seem to lose interest if there are interruptions (med distribution, staff change, temporary lock-downs, etc.). However, on this day, all the girls, including Tanya, returned to the discussion after each interruption. It was heartwarming to see her determination to participate. Tanya is also working on earning a set of Bible tabs for indexing the books in her Bible. She has memorized the first 10 books of the Bible and is working on the next several. Please keep this young lady in your prayers as she has addiction and home life issues to deal with and is only in her mid-teens. ~Kim Danielson

10th Treatment Home

One of the girls was really struggling in the process of juvenile detention and treatment. "This is my 10th treatment home. I feel like this don't work for me. I'm not here to be anyone's friend, I'm just here to do my time." William asked why she shouldn't look for ways to get something out of her time in detention instead of just "doing the time." He suggested that if she had the attitude that she wasn't going to learn anything, then she wouldn't. Her response was that in detention, they learn that they need to respect staff and others, and they learn discipline, but when they go home, there isn't anyone to reinforce that. At this point, a West Central staff member spoke up and said, "The system was not set up to teach you what your parents were supposed to teach you. You don't know what you don't know." She talked about how both her parents died when she was young, and she had a lot of experience with being a kid 'in the system.' We love it when even the staff engage in our discussions. ~Kim Danielson

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What Does that Mean?

Here are a list of popular words teens are using and how our teens explain them. We don't recommend using them, but hopefully this will help you better understand the teens in your life.

- O **Slap:** Something amazing or excellent. (E.g. These tacos slap.)
- O **Glazing/Glaze:** To "glaze" someone means to feed them compliments that are so over-the-top that they come across as cringe-worthy or phony. While the goal to win someone over with flattery, it's often unsuccessful because they can see right through it.
- O Mid: Average/Unimpressive. (E.g. The food at school was mid today.)
- O What's up Brother: Trend from YouTube where you point your pointer finger up in the air and say "What's up brother" typically to close friends.
- O **Periodt:** Finished/all done. (E.g. I don't want to hear another word from you periodt.) The "T" is there for finality.

The school reached out if I knew anyone that could help in this situation by giving the boy a ride. My eyes lit up when I read the email, and I quickly responded that I could give him a ride. To the school, this is just providing a way for a boy to be able to play basketball. However, this has given me an opportunity to have thirty minutes five days a week one-on-one with a boy who doesn't know Jesus. The basketball season may not be very long, but his eternal salvation is lifelong. Please be praying for our conversations as I continue to pour into him eternally.

I also would like to say thank you to anyone that has donated to YFC. One of my conversations after practice with this boy was about dinner because he said he was hungry as we drove to his house. I asked him what he normally eats, and he responded, "I don't know, I have to see if we even have food for me to cook because we can't buy any more food until my mom gets paid again". My heart broke in that moment as I began to think about when I was his age and how hungry I was after practice, and I couldn't imagine not knowing if I would have food when I got home. "Mr. Will is cool now, and I want to meet with him."
